- Limited parking

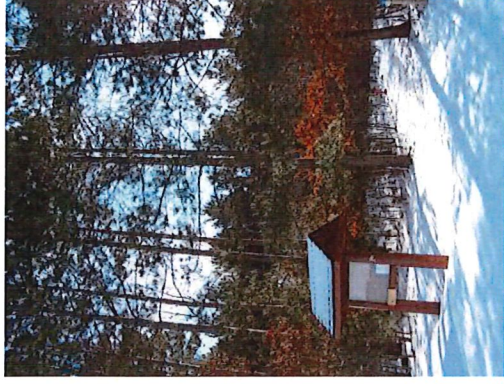
Located on the picturesque St. Croix River, the access has limited capacity. Fines may be assessed for parking outside designated spaces, and on Glenmont Rd.

BIKE TRAILS

The Town has marked bike and pedestrian trails, with extended paved and striped shoulders on North and South Glover Roads; N. Glover Rd. connects with Coulee Trail, southeast of Hudson; S. Glover Rd. connects to Co. Rd. U, southerly to Pierce Co. M to City of River Falls and Town of Clifton; and east on Co. Rd. U, north on Radio Rd./ St. Croix County U to Hwy. 35 overpass; and east on Powell Ave. to Main St., City of River Falls. Extended paved and striped shoulders on N. Townsvalley Rd. with designated route west on E. Cove Rd

The **PARK BOARD**, appointed by the Town Board, is comprised of seven Town residents, including one elected Town Board liaison. Park Board meetings, open to the public, are generally held the 4th Tues. of each month at 7pm. at the Town Hall.

Town of Troy

The Town of Troy borders the lower St. Croix National Scenic Riverway to the west and is one of the western-most townships in St. Croix County, Wisconsin. Troy is located between the historic and vibrant cities of Hudson and River Falls.

Residents and visitors can enjoy the rural landscape in local parks, which complement the town's rich agricultural tradition. Recreation in the town of Troy provides safe and active outdoor opportunities for the diverse population. Town's Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan 2020-25 is available on town's website.

Park areas include Cove Boat Ramp, Glover Park, Pemble's Access, and marked bike and pedestrian trails along designated town roads. The town Park Rangers and St. Croix County Sheriff's Dept. patrol the parks on a regular basis. Violators may be ticketed; fines may be assessed.

Park Board mission: to plan, acquire, develop, and maintain parkland; and, to provide the citizens of Troy with a park system for the conservation, preservation, and enjoyment of the natural environment and the recreational facilities provided.

COVE BOAT RAMP

306A S. Cove Rd., Hudson

SEASON: daily, year-round

HOURS: 6am – 9:30pm

- Concrete launch ramp
- Dock and gangway
- Winter use by foot, ATV, or snowmobile across ramp only
- Parking **ONLY** in marked spaces, including 1 handicapped space next to the ramp

Cove Boat Ramp was upgraded and renovated in 2004 with improved access for boaters to the St. Croix River. Bulletins, describing permit rates, rules/regulations, and Annual Permits are available at the Town Hall and Disposal Center during regular business hours. Daily permits are available at the Boat Ramp. Facility is routinely patrolled; violators will be ticketed.

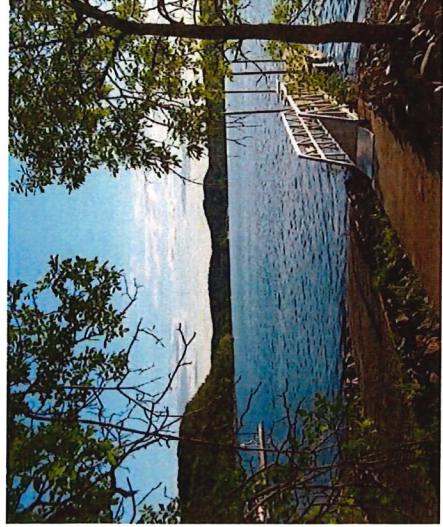

GLOVER PARK

428 N. Glover Rd., Hudson

SEASON: daily, year-round

HOURS: 8am – ½ hour after sunset

- Community Bldg. with modern restrooms and baby changing stations
- East Hein and North Pavilion (kitchen)
- Water fountain (auto & hand pump)
- Outside water bottle filler
- Hiking trail system, 2.5 miles (marked)
- North and South Ball Fields
- Native prairie gardens & remnant
- Pickleball courts (2)
- Bike repair shelter- repair tools, air pump
- Benches located throughout the park
- Ample parking and bike racks

Playground



Play events include track ride, space net, swings (accessible seat), horizontal and vertical climber, digger, and slide. Accessibility for individuals with physical challenges, includes a rubberized surface to play platform and slide.

Trail System

The trail system circles the 40-acre park and was expanded in 2006 and 2009 with over 2.5 miles into the wooded bluffs of the western sections. Eagle Trail and Omaha Access were updated to a gravel surface in 2019-20. Hikers can enjoy "Summit Loop," an overlook in the NW corner at the highest point. Outdoor enthusiasts can find a natural habitat diverse with mature pines and hardwoods, native specimen trees, native flowers, ferns, wild berries, and wildlife along the marked trails. A detailed interpretive map is posted at the Community Bldg., Eagle Trail-Eagle Pass, and Northwest Eagle Trail kiosks. Visitors can pick up maps and park brochures at the Hein Pavilion & outside the community building.

Ball Fields, Pickleball & Pavilions

Two ball fields, South Field and North Field, have crowd bleachers and picnic tables. Ball field maintenance is shared with volunteers from the Hudson and River Falls youth ball organizations, who reserve the fields Mon.-Fri. from approximately April 1-July 31 (afternoons and evenings).

The North Pavilion, completed in 2019, has a community kitchen. The two pavilions and kitchen are available to the public through a reservation policy. **Contact the Town Clerk's office for information.**
